
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We're Back!

For me, I stand there, nod a little bit, and pretend I'm listening, when in fact, I'm wondering when that person will stop talking and I can move on with my life. One of those things that people always seem to tell me is how lucky I am to attend Fillmore. If I had a quarter for every time someone told me that I go to a good school, I'd be a rich woman. However, the good thing about hearing something way too many times is that you begin to question at how true it really is. Is Fillmore really better than any other public school? of about 750 students. We have grades Pre-K-12, and have classes of roughly 50 people. For the size

Our school caters to students of all types with all sorts of interests. However, this does not even begin to measure the amount of teacher involvement in student life. The greatest difference of all is the student body's kindness for everyone in the school. As a group, with a few exceptions, we treat each other remarkably well. Harassment and bullying aren't the same thing; harassment targets a specific quality about the target. Harassment includes threats, intimidation or abuse based on: race,



weight, ethnicity, religion, disability, sexual orientation, gender, etc. Harassment creates a hostile environment that af-

fects a person's mental, emotional and/or physical well-being.

If you witness bullying, harassment, or are being bullied, or harassed, the best thing to do is speak up. Tell the bully to stop. It may seem like just saying




Dear Miss Space,


